- A longer quotation, (over 40 words) should appear in a separate block, e.g.:

***Please, before submitting the paper/manuscript, check the following:***

- The article's title reflects the purpose, aims, and content of the article.
- Your article is well-organized and prepared according to aforementioned technical guidelines.
- Your paper has 10 pages at least.
- Your paper is written in standard, literary and professional English language, without spelling and grammar mistakes.
- The *Abstract* of the your paper includes the purpose and the aims of the paper, its methods, its structure, its basic results, and the conclusion concerning the possible application of the results.
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- The research results are valid with the respect to the relevance of the methodology applied, conclusions, and recommendations.
- *Conclusion* illustrates the research results, research limitations, findings and recommendation showing what is new and giving suggestion for future research.
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- The paper gives contribution to economic theory and practice and social issues. It is interesting and relevant for local and international readers.
